THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY,

*Recognizing* the ongoing conflict in Ukraine which has led to the displacement of several thousands of individuals,

*Bearing in mind* the objective of the United Nations (UN) to guarantee international peace and security,

*Aware* that a just and lasting solution will be necessary to ensure peace, prosperity, and collaboration between all parties of the conflict,

1. Emphasizes the fundamental rights of Ukraine as a member of the UN to national sovereignty and territorial integrity, allowing for the complete withdrawal of Russian military forces from the nation proper and the establishment of lasting peace in respect to these rights through:
  - a. calling upon all member states not to legitimize any of Russian claims which infringe on Ukraine's sovereignty, including but limited to the territories of:
    - i. Crimea
    - ii. Donetsk
    - iii. Luhansk
  - b. holding a multilateral peace summit to negotiate the terms of the Russian withdrawal, with, in addition to Russian and Ukrainian representatives, the following key actors present:
    - i. The North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO)
    - ii. The European Union
  - c. urging nations to unilaterally condemn Russian aggression.

**Advice:**

**This resolution is fully pro-Ukraine. It basically advocates for the full retreat of Russian troops and for Russia to stop claiming Ukrainian territory. To defend it, you will need to emphasize the importance of international law and Ukraine's rights as a country that can't just have its territory taken without any consequences. Talk about international law (the [UN charter](#) is a good place to start), Russia's human rights violations, and the moral importance of this matter.**
